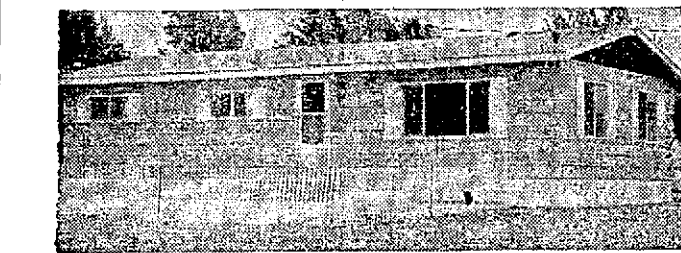

FAYETTE—A specially-designed
triangular display case, made to house the college's traditional graduation gowns, has been presented to Upper Iowa college by the Faculty Wives club.
