permits you to accept with gratitude and enthusiasm all the riches that are meant for you, and to use them creatively and joyously to bring happiness to yourself and others."





#### APPLESAUCE NUT LOAF

1/2 cup oleo	2 1/2 t. baking powder
3/4 cup sugar	1 t. salt
2 eggs	1/2 t. soda
2 1/4 cup flour	1/2 t. clinnamon

Cream oleo, sugar, add eggs. Combine flour, baking powder, sait, soda and cinnamon. Reserve a small amount of flour mixture. Add flour mixture to creamed mixture alternately with applesauce ending with dry ingredients. Foss nuts and dates with remaining flour mixture and stir altogther. Bake in 9 x 5 x 2" pan for 350 degrees for 65 to 70 minutes.
