Outside of the desert and mountain regions of Kern County, mostly dry conditions continued in the month of June across the HSA, with well above average temperatures across the region. Above average high temperatures lead to the depletion of the snowpack across the HSA, given levels were nearly depleted already at the start of the month. Dry weather prevailed across the entire HAS for the first 3 weeks of the month until monsoonal moisture lead to the arrival of thunderstorms in the Kern Mountains and Desert areas around June 22nd. Afternoon showers and thunderstorms appeared across the Coastal Range, Tehachapi Mountains, and portions of the Sierra Nevada for a few days. A couple of stations in the Mojave Desert recorded 3/10" of rain, namely at Edwards Air Force Base. These monsoonal influxes did little to improve the drought situation as the majority rainfall was localized to Kern County or the higher elevations of the Sierra Nevada. Rivers remained at or near historically low flows and levels accordingly. Some light showers did measure recordable precipitation across our 5 ASOS stations in the San Joaquin Valley in late June.

Drought conditions were unchanged from May to June across the HSA, with most of the mountain and foothill areas staying at D4 (Exceptional Drought, Fig 2).





Fig 1 – Percent of Average Precipitation for June 2022




 $Fig\ 2-Drought\ Status\ for\ the\ state\ of\ California$
