

HURRICANE CINDY SEPTEMBER 16-18, 1963

Preliminary Report with Advisories and Bulletins Issued



PRELIMINARY REPORT ON HURRICANE "CINDY",

September 16-18, 1963

Hurricane "Cindy", the first in the Gulf of Mexico in two years, formed in the northwestern Gulf about 150-200 miles off the Texas coast on September 16. A bulletin issued at 9:00 a.m. by the Weather Bureau hurricane warning center at New Orleans advised of the developing storm. At 1:00 p.m. gale warnings were hoisted from Freeport, Texas to Grand Isle, Louisiana. At 2 p.m. the SS Sabine reported hurricane force winds and gave the location of the center about 200 miles east of Corpus Christi. Hurricane warnings were ordered from Galveston to Vermilion Bay at 4 p.m. The storm moved northward at an average speed of 8 miles per hour. It remained small in area and stopped intensifying after barely reaching hurricane force.

The hurricane crossed the Texas coast in the Galveston - Port Arthur area on September 17 then became nearly stationary and produced persistent heavy rains in the Beaumont -Port Arthur - Orange area. It gradually diminished in strength, and on the 19th the remnants drifted southwestward and southward over Texas

More than 15 inches of rain fell in some places near the upper Texas coast and in extreme southwest Louisiana. Early reports estimate flood damage as high as \$11.5 million. There was little damage from wind or tide.

About 3600 persons in the Texas coastal area and 6,000 in southwestern Louisiana are reported to have evacuated in response to the Weather Bureau's hurricane warnings. No loss of life was reported.

Surface ships, the Weather Bureau radar stations at Galveston, Lake Charles, and New Orleans, and Navy reconnaissance aircraft assisted in the tracking of the hurricane. Because the storm was rather poorly developed and its eye or center ill-defined, however, radar tracking was difficult. This is in contrast to tracking of a well-developed hurricane, such as "Carla" in 1961, which presents a clear-cut pattern on the radarscope.

ADVISORIES AND BULLETINS

NEW ORLEANS WEATHER BUREAU BULLETIN 9 AM CST SEPTEMBER 16 1963

A LOW PRESSURE AREA APPEARS TO BE DEVELOPING IN THE NORTHWEST GULF OF MEXICO 150 TO 200 HILES EAST OF BROWNSVILLE TEXAS. SPECIAL REPORTS FROM SHIPS IN THAT AREA HAVE BEEN REQUESTED AND A RECONNAISSANCE FLIGHT IS PLANNED FOR EARLY THIS AFTERNOON. THE HIGHEST WINDS REPORTED SO FAR ARE ABOUT 30 MPH IN SQUALLS. SHOWERS ARE OCCURRING ALONG THE NORTHERN GULF COAST AND SEAS ARE BECOMING ROUGH. SMALL CRAFT ALONG THE UPPER TEXAS AND LOUISIANA COSTS SHOULD NOT VENTURE INTO THE OPEN GULF.

CONDITIONS APPEAR FAVORABLE FOR FURTHER INTENSIFICATION AND ALL INTERESTS ALONG THE TEXAS AND LOUISIANA COASTS SHOULD LISTEN FOR FUTURE BULLETINS OR ADVISORIES. THE NEXT BULLETIN WILL BE ISSUED AT 1 PM CST UNLESS CONDITIONS WARRANT AN EARLIER RELEASE.

NEW ORLEANS WEATHER BUREAU TROPICAL STORM ADVISORY NUMBER 1 CINDY 1 PM CST SEPTEMBER 16 1963

HOIST GALE WARNINGS AT 1 PM CST FROM FREEPORT TEXAS TO GRAND ISLE LOUISIANA AND A HURRICANE WATCH IS ADVISED FOR THAT AREA.

SHIP REPORTS IN THE NORTHWEST GULF OF MEXICO INDICATE THAT THE TROPICAL LOW HAS REACHED TROPICAL STORM INTENSITY. AT 1 PM CST ...1900Z...TROPICAL STORM CINDY WAS CENTERED NEAR LATITUDE 27.4 LONGITUDE 94.0 OR ABOUT 140 MILES SOUTH SOUTHEAST OF GALVESTON TEXAS AND WAS MOVING SLOWLY NORTHWARD. HIGHEST WINDS ARE ESTIMATED ABOUT 50 MPH NEAR THE CENTER AND GALES EXTEND OUTWARD 50 TO 100 MILES TO THE NORTH AND EAST OF THE CENTER.

CINDY IS EXPECTED TO MOVE NORTHWARD ABOUT 10 MPH AND SHOULD CONTINUE TO INTENSIFY SLOWLY. IT MAY REACH HURRICANE FORCE BEFORE MOVING INLAND ON THE UPPER TEXAS OR WESTERN LOUISIANA COAST LATE TONIGHT. TIDES 3 TO 5 FEET ABOVE NORMAL ARE EXPECTED IN THE FREEPORT TO GRAND ISLE AREA AND PERSONS LIVING IN LOW AREAS ALONG THE COAST THAT CAN BE FLOODED BY THESE TIDES SHOULD MOVE TO HIGHER GROUND IMMEDIATELY.

WINDS AND TIDES ARE EXPECTED TO INCREASE ALONG THE UPPER TEXAS AND LOUISIANA COAST THIS AFTERNOON WITH WINDS REACHING GALE FORCE IN THE AREA OF DISPLAY BEFORE MIDNIGHT.

A RECONNAISSANCE AIRCRAFT IS ENROUTE TO INVESTIGATE THE STORM AND ADDITIONAL DATA WILL BE AVAILABLE THIS AFTERNOON.

CHANGE TO HURRICANE WARNINGS AT 4 PM CST FROM GALVESTON TEXAS TO VERMILION BAY LOUISIANA. PRECAUTIONS AGAINST HURRICANE FORCE WINDS AND 5 TO 8 FOOT TIDES SHOULD BE TAKEN IMMEDIATELY IN THAT AREA. GALE WARNINGS ARE DISPLAYED ELSEWHERE FROM FREEPORT TEXAS TO GRAND ISLE LOUISIANA.

CINDY CONTINUES TO INTENSIFY AND HAS NOW REACHED HURRICANE FORCE. AT 4 PM CST...2200Z...HURRICANE CINDY WAS CENTERED NEAR LATITUDE 27.8 LONGITUDE 94.0 OR ABOUT 100 MILES SOUTH SOUTHEAST OF GALVESTON TEXAS AND MOVING SLOWLY NORTHWARD. HIGHEST WINDS ARE ESTIMATED ABOUT 80 MPH NEAR THE CENTER AND HURRICANE FORCE WINDS EXTEND OUTWARD ABOUT 30 MILES AND GALES EXTEND OUTWARD 100 MILES TO NORTH AND EAST OF THE CENTER.

CINDY IS EXPECTED TO MOVE NORTHWARD ABOUT 10 MPH AND INTENSIFY SLOWLY. IT SHOULD MOVE INLAND ON THE UPPER TEXAS COAST OR EXTREME WESTERN LOUISIANA COAST LATE TONIGHT. WINDS ARE EXPECTED TO INCREASE ON UPPER TEXAS AND LOUISIANA COAST REACHING GALE FORCE IN AREA OF DISPLAY BEFORE MIDNIGHT AND REACHING HURRICANE FORCE IN AREA OF HURRICANE DISPLAY SOON AFTER MIDNIGHT TONIGHT. TIDE WILL INCREASE REACHING 5 TO 8 FEET GALVESTON TO VERMILION BAY AND 3 TO 5 FEET ELSEWHERE BETWEEN FREEPORT AND GRAND ISLE LATE TONIGHT.

HURRICANE WARNINGS ARE DISPLAYED CALVESTON TEXAS TO VERMILION BAY LOUISIANA AND CALE WARNINGS ELSEWHERE FREEPORT TEXAS TO GRAND ISLE LOUISIANA.

HURRICANE CINDY CONTINUES TO MOVE SLOWLY NORTHWARD AND AT 6 PM CST WAS CENTERED NEAR LATITUDE 28 LONGITUDE 94 OR ABOUT 90 HILES SOUTH SOUTHEAST OF GALVESTON TEXAS. CINDY IS NOT WELL ORGANIZED AND THE EYE OF THE STORM IS LARGE AND ILL DEFINED.

HURRICANE WARNINGS ARE DISPLAYED GALVESTON TEXAS TO VERMILION BAY LOUISIANA AND GALE WARNINGS ELSEWHERE FREEPORT TEXAS TO GRAND ISLE LOUISIANA.

HURRICANE CINDY CONTINUED TO MOVE SLOWLY NORTHWARD AND AT MIDNIGHT CST IT WAS CENTERED ABOUT 90 MILES SOUTH OF PORT ARTHUR TEXAS.

RADAR REPORTS INDICATE HURRICANE CINDY IS NOW MOVING SLOWLY NORTH NORTHWESTWARD AND AT 4 AM CST...1000Z...IT WAS CENTERED NEAR LATITUDE 29.1 LONGITUDE 94.3 OR ABOUT 35 MILES SOUTHEAST OF GALVESTON TEXAS.

THE HURRICANE IS UNDER THE SURVEILLANCE OF LAKE CHARLES AND GALVESTON RADAR WHICH SHOW THAT THE EYE IS STILL ILL DEFINED.

HIGHEST WINDS ARE ESTIMATED ABOUT 80 MPH IN SQUALLS NEAR THE CENTER AND GALES EXTEND OUTWARD ABOUT 100 MILES FROM THE CENTER.
