Weather Summary

A "History of Bethlehem, PA 1741 -1892" called the Great Flood of 1862 "the most disastrous flood on record in the valley." The Lehigh River rose more rapidly than had ever been known before on the afternoon of June 4, 1862. Citing records maintained by the Bethlehem Bridge Company, noted the water gauge on the Lehigh River reached 20.5 feet, slightly above the Great Flood of January 1841 (20 feet). The Lehigh River eventually crested around noon on June 5, 1862, although the Delaware continued to rise, swelled by the very heavy runoff from tributaries entering the river basin.
