

SEVERE WEATHER SAFETY

PREPARE

Before Severe Weather Hits

- Check the forecast
- Change or delay plans if weather may impact travel
- Have ways to receive weather alerts if plans are outdoors
- Create an emergency kit for your car and home

REACT

During Severe Weather Events

- Seek shelter from thunderstorms in a home or vehicle.
- Avoid washes, drainages, and slot canyons during heavy rainfall.
- Head local warnings or advisories.

RESPOND

After Severe Weather has Passed

- Never drive through flooded roads.
- Stay away from downed power lines.
- Wait until you can no longer hear Thunder before being outside.

Spotter Reporting Criteria

Tornado or Funnel Cloud

- Location
- Direction

Winds over 40 MPH

- Measured or Estimated

Wind Damage

- Nature of the damage (branch size, tree size, structural damage etc.)
- Extent of damage (widespread or isolated)
- Power outages

Flooding

- Depth
- Flowing or standing
- Street closures
- Water into buildings

Hail

- Size
- Damage

Snow

- Accumulation
- Poor travel conditions

Visibility less than 1/2mi

- Travel Issues

Your reports are used in REAL-TIME to make weather decisions that keep you and your community safe!

How to Report

- ✓ **Your name** “This is a trained spotter, Jane Doe”
- ✓ **Weather** “It’s flooding”
- ✓ **Impacts** “A major roadway is washed out”
- ✓ **Time** “Water started flowing over the roadway at 4 PM”
- ✓ **Location** “Near the intersection of Pierce Ferry & HWY 93”

Do not Exaggerate Reports
Tell exactly what you see

If in doubt, report it anyway!

MEASURING HAIL

<p>COINS</p>	Relate size to objects like: 0.25" Pea
	0.50" M&M
<p>BALLS</p>	0.75" Penny
	1.00" Quarter
<p>FOOD</p>	1.25" Half Dollar
	1.50" Ping Pong Ball
	1.75" Golf Ball
	2.00" Hen Egg

Report the size of the LARGEST hailstone

ESTIMATING WIND

39-46 MPH	Twigs and small branches broken off trees	
47-54 MPH	Slight structural damage occurs; shingles blown from roof	
55-63 MPH	Trees broken; structural damage occurs	
64-72 MPH	Widespread damage to trees and buildings	
73+ MPH	Extensive damage
